LANLIVERY NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN COMMUNITY & ENGAGEMENT STRATEGY

The Parish of Lanlivery was designated as a Neighbourhood Plan Area on 24th February 2015. A Steering group was formed comprising Parish Councillors, the Parish Clerk and members of the public. Terms of Reference and a process schedule were agreed by the Steering Group & Parish Council.

The Steering Group is compiling a questionnaire to send out to every household and business. These will be sent with the Granite Towers (parish magazine) as it is delivered to every household/business in the Parish. Spare copies will be placed in the church and an explanatory article put in Granite Towers itself.

The Steering Group will hold community events at both the Annual Feast Week in early May 2015 and at the Annual Parish Meeting in April 2015 to both raise public awareness and ask for comments and opinions. This should be especially helpful as members of the public will have received their questionnaires by this time.

It is also agreed that the best means of public engagement would be to use:

- 1. Granite Towers and Down Your Way in the Cornish Guardian
- 2. Annual Parish Meetings as these are reasonably well attended by members of the public and before/after ordinary Parish Meetings where appropriate
- 3. The Parish Council Website and noticeboard
- 4. Hard copies of documents to be available in the church or direct from the Parish Clerk
- 5. All drafts of NP to be looked at by full steering group
- 6. Statutory Consultation will be made by email.

The aims of the Lanlivery NP are:

- 1.To protect and enhance our valued and astoundingly beautiful Parish whilst at the same time positively planning for the types of development and facilities we do need.
- 2.To develop a Plan that is in line with the NPPF and Cornwall Local Plan; whilst at the same time is in keeping with the Parish of Lanlivery and the proven aspirations of the parishioners.
- 3. That policies are aimed at making sure opportunities are created for local people to build to solve their own housing problems and that they are positively supported through the planning process.
