News from Luxulyan School

We have been very busy going out and about recently.

Oak and Sycamore Class Trip to Royal Cornwall Museum

On Thursday the 7th of November, Oak and Sycamore Class went to visit the Royal Cornwall Museum. First, we took part in a mineral and mining trail in one of the exhibition rooms. There were crystals and gems to look at and touch and artefacts from the mining times. One artefact we all thought was cool was the mummified tortoise shell.

After lunch, we went into the mummification cave where we learnt about the mummification process. We even saw real canopic jars which the Ancient Egyptians used to store and preserve organs. The most exciting part of the day was seeing a real mummified person named Iset-tayef-nakht. He's a 2,700-year-old mummy who died at 65 years old, which was very old in Ancient Egypt.

The trip was amazing, and everyone said it was one of the best we've been on.

Year Trip to Wheal Martyn Museum

Year 1 went to the Wheal Martyn Clay Works as part of their learning about local history. In the morning, we had a tour of the site, led by Nolan who is a volunteer at the Museum. We loved seeing the water wheel in action as we moved round and saw the different stages of the process of clay mining. We then walked up to the pit view to see clay mining in action.

In the afternoon we had a workshop called 'Working Life for Me'. The children started off by looking at photos of the local area and understanding the importance of the china clay industry. We also learnt about the many uses of china clay and took turns acting them out for each other to guess. We then looked at photos from the Victorian times of St. Austell and people involved in the clay mining industry. Finally, we got to have a go at dressing up as a pit captain, kettle boy and bal maiden.

Archaeology Dig at Treffry Viaduct

Sycamore and Oak Class had the opportunity to go down to the archaeological dig at the Treffry Viaduct. We walked down to the Valley and headed to the Crib Hut where we saw holes marked with pegs in the ground. Archaeologists were digging there and at that moment they found something that was part of a clay plate. We also held some artefacts from previous digs that they have done, such as clay pipes, shoe soles and part of an old portable stove.



Key Stage 1 Multi-skills

12 children from Year 1 and Year 2 travelled to Poltair for a multi-skills festival. The children worked brilliantly as a team and had a great time. What's more, Luxulyan School also came in first place in the relay race against all of the other CELT schools who took part! A great achievement. 

LUXULYAN 100 YEARS AGO

Items transcribed from the original text in the Cornish Guardian

5 December 1924: Luxulyan Right-of-Way. With reference to the alleged obstruction to the Ponts Mill and Luxulyan right-of-way, a correspondent writes suggesting that the Bodmin Rural District Council are only acting in a half-hearted manner in this matter. The path, he says, has been closed against the public the whole of the summer and nothing yet has been done to stop the illegal act. -----

I was told by a man who is 75 years old that as a boy of ten years old he worked in a mine above Ponts Mill with his father and used to go to work by this path.

17 December 1924: LANXON-WEST. December 15th at the Parish Church, Luxulyan, by Rev CF Jones, Harold, only son of Mrs and the late Mr R Lanxon, Pool St, Bodmin to Annie S, younger daughter of Mr & Mrs W West, Canna, Bugle.

9 January 1925: New Year's Day Festivities. Through the kindness of Dr Nat Coulson of San Francisco, the schoolchildren in the parish of Luxulyan were entertained to tea on New Year's Day, this was followed by a public tea and in the evening the schoolroom was crowded for a capital concert, the vocal and instrumental numbers for which were contributed by Mrs Chirgwin, Miss Eugene Beswetherick, Miss Betty Northcott, Mr CB Jolliffe, Mr H Burton, Mr JA Beswetherick and the Luxulvan Male Quartette. Colonel Sir William Serjeant CB St Benets Lanivet presided.

After the concert there was a firework display in the boys' playground, and later the company adjourned to the lower glebe field, where a huge bonfire was lit by Sir William, the blaze from which could be seen for miles around. The proceeds were in aid of the Luxulyan Institute fund, to which Dr Coulson has contributed £100.

16 January: Mr RB Anderson of Bodmin examined the Luxulyan branch of the St Johns Ambulance Association, to whom Mr Hocking, of St Blazey has been the lecturer, assisted by Mr W Rady and Mr AL White, with Mr WT Roach as secretary. Results: First aid certificates Messrs John Hosking, Walter Roach, John Keam, Clifford Darlington, William Crowle, Clifford Roach. Vouchers Messrs Owen Williams, Alfred Roach and Leonard Darlington. Medallion Mr Arthur Pinch.

LOCAL WRITER & GRANITE TOWERS CONTRIBUTOR IS PROOF YOU SHOULD NEVER GIVE UP ON YOUR DREAMS

After spending a decade of her retirement penning novels and accumulating rejection letters Christine McHaines received the gift of a lifetime on her 77th birthday - a five-book publishing deal for her cozy crime series.

Christine, who has been contributing short stories to The Granite Towers for more than a decade, always harboured ambitions to become a novelist, but it wasn't until recently she learned her books would finally be published.

"I was in the car with my husband, on the way back from an appointment at Treliske Hospital, when the email arrived on my mobile," she shared. "I was so stunned, I couldn't speak. I had to double-check on my bigger screen at home to make sure it was real.'

And it was real. The publisher expressed interest not only in her initial submission but in her entire 'Quentin Cadbury Investigations' series—the latest of which is set against the picturesque backdrop of Cornwall.

"I've always been drawn to Cornwall's beauty," Christine explained. "I knew early on I'd set one of my books here. I've been taking notes and photographs for years of anything that sparked an idea I might one day use. There are key scenes in this book set around the St Austell Bay area. There's the famed Eden Project, which is right on our doorstep, but there are also scenes at some lesser-known places like St Austell's leisure centre. It's nice to include some of those less famous places from where I live."

Christine's publisher, Erik Empson of The Book Folks, praises her ability to weave engaging tales with relatable characters. 'Her quirky protagonist duo and light-hearted style is easy reading, and in her latest book, she captures the landscape and way of life of Cornwall to a tee."

In her newest release, *The Mystery on the Cornish Coast*, the young detective Quentin Cadbury and his partner, Wanda Merrydrew, face peril when a notorious criminal they helped imprison escapes.

Forced to deliver a mysterious package or face dire consequences, they embark on a dangerous adventure along the Cornish coast.

The Mystery on the Cornish Coast, the fourth standalone book in the series, is available on Kindle and in paperback or hardback at Amazon. Or grab an author-signed paperback copy at local independent bookshop, Hurley Books in Mevagissey.

Hopefully some of you have already managed to read at least one of the books in the series – I have and highly recommend them – Ed!







LUXULYAN VALLEY




The last three months have been a busy time for FOLV.

ROBERT 'MORLEY' RICHARDS 26TH MARCH 1935 – 16TH OCTOBER 2024

Morley was born in March 1935 in Sweetshouse to Alfred Jack and Martha Richards, and had an older sister called Loveday. He attended school in Bodmin between the ages of 6 and 16, and then worked at home for the family corn merchant business.

At the age of 19 he joined the army where did his initial training in the DCLI Barracks in Bodmin, before joining the Ox and Bucks regiment moving to Germany as a driver for the officers. He was fondly known locally as the Major. His time in the army stayed with him and he enjoyed telling everyone how many steps there were per minute in various marches and would march up and down the lounge at home demonstrating how it should be done.

Morley and Mary met when Mary was 15. She had been in the lorry with her cousin David delivering logs to the corn store. Morley asked who Mary was and wanted to know if she was going to the dance at Lanhydrock that evening. She did go and the rest is history. Morley married Mary Thomas in July 1957 at St Petroc's church in Bodmin. They had four children, and the family home was at Boslymon.

Morley adored his family and was never happier than when he had a baby on his knee. He had eight Grandchildren, and seven Great Grandchildren. He loved to hear what they had all been up to, especially their achievements and of course the naughty stories. Over the years he taught all the children many songs and nursery rhymes that he had sung as a boy and loved telling them tales about the animals.

W. Richards and Son was started around 1916 by Walter and Edith, and their son Alfred John. Back then, deliveries of corn were made by horse and cart. Morley and Mary worked alongside his dad Alf for many years and then later, with his own sons Mark and Matthew. Morley was still keen to help out well into his 80's and would drop off a few bags where needed.

Morley had a small holding at Boslymon where he reared pigs and beef cattle, and always had horses. It wasn't unusual for the kitchen to be a nursery for the farrows and Morley would spoon feed them whisky and hot milk to give them a good start. As the pigs grew, they had to be moved down the road into the piggery. All the family have memories of piglets escaping, running in all directions and Morley shouting "grab their back leg". Morley was passionate about horses, especially following the hunt and point to point racing. He was on the South Cornwall Hunt point to point committee, and he was clerk of the scales for the East Cornwall hunt point to point.

He was frequently involved in local community events including Lanlivery Feast week and was a long-standing member of the Lanlivery Loonies. He sat on the committee for the Lanlivery Vintage Rally and drove his lorry for various groups in Bodmin and Lostwithiel carnivals, as well as carol singing at Christmas. He was also a keen bellringer and has been treasurer and secretary for the bellringers at Lanlivery church.

Morley was always happy to help out at charity events and he took part in hand bell ringing at Christmas and abseiled down the church tower raising money for the new church roof. Due to his community work he was invited to the Queen's Garden Party at Buckingham Palace which he was proud to attend but wasn't a big fan of the London underground!

Morley was a true gentleman, a much loved, husband, dad and papa, and will be greatly missed by all those who had the pleasure of meeting him.

Thursday 04 December 1930


PRESENTATION AT LANLIVERY. On Friday, Nov. 28th, Miss E. A. Keat resigned her position as headmistress of Lanlivery School on account of her forthcoming marriage. The occasion was marked by a happy event, when the senior girls presented her with an oxydised copper coalbox and companion set, which was subscribed for by the staff and scholars of the school and by other well-wisher. Miss Keat carries with her the good wishes of a large circle of friends.

Friday 08 December 1922

LANLIVERY TROUNCED. Our footballers were given a severe setback at Saturday when they had a severe trouncing by a superior combination from Mount Charles and retired beaten by 7 goals to nil. It was an exhibition game and it showed that much practice is needed by the home club before they can hope to bring off many wins in matches with local teams of longer experience. The committee have arranged several fixtures. which include matches with recognised strong teams so that the boys will have plenty of opportunities to improve as the season advances.

Thursday 27 December 1956

Aged 70, Still Walking At Lanlivery sub post office, where Mrs. Henwood is subpost mistress, the Lanlivery mall was quickly sorted by Miss Henwood for her father, who is the village postman, to take on his round. At 75, Mr. G. Henwood has been a post man for about 20 years at Lanlivery, and regularly does his ten miles or so in all weathers. His farthest point is a I farm called Brainey, almost in the shadow of Helman Tor, but on this round he had not to call there. One of the things one quickly gets to know on a postal round is that there are very few dwellings, if any at all, where mail never goes. To the uninitiated, it is thrilling see, for the first time, little houses, or even farms, which he never knew existed; or which, having vaguely seen in driving by, he was able now to take note of. The Lanlivery and Luxulyan rural delivery entails driving about 46 miles and making at least 50 different calls, and on Monday every place was called at, except one.

DIANE OLIVER: EULOGY & FAMILY TRIBUTE

Mother, Mum, Mummy, Grandma, Great Grandma, Aunty Di, Diane, Mrs Oliver...

"A lovely lady" and a "wonderful teacher", "we shared a giggle together", she was "highly respected in the village", you "never heard a bad word said about her", "her smile took all worries away." Your words, Luxulyan.

Archetypal infant teacher and exemplary mother - eldest daughter of Dot and George Bardle and sister to her beloved Gillian. Modest and self-effacing, she allowed herself "a moment's self-congratulation, that her children hadn't turned out badly at all."

She played the recorder, guitar and "I always remember Mrs Oliver playing the piano in assemblies with her eyes closed and smiling like she was enjoying every moment...". She taught some in the village their first steps in music, played for the Christmas shows at school and held music as her private delight throughout her life.

"She cared about everyone, she brought up people rather than just children; she cared about the people they would become, ..."

"As a colleague, she was very helpful in all kinds of ways, personal and professional; very wise, thought deeply about things, she was calm and very organised." Mum coped with the frustrations of living with an elderly parent by going and opening a cupboard for a private scream. And yet, she appeared to have infinite patience.

Born in 1937, Diane's home in Hertford, the family soon moved to St Albans, where Diane grew up round the corner from Ralph. In 1959, she started teaching in Kettering, while Ralph was away for four years in Africa. Distance did the trick, and after Dad, the pig farmer, wooed her from Bodiggo, she married him in 1963 and was persuaded to take up the headship of a rural Cornish school, with an iron stove in the corner, while residing in a caravan, as he rebuilt a granite barn with earth floors, into a dream.

Diane built her place in Luxulyan as schoolteacher, Village Hall secretary, originator of the first playgroup; Smarties helper; bellringer; church choir member; kept-fit regular; LADS stalwart, ...

Recognisable by her white hair she never changed for her pupils, though being greeted at Luxulyan carnival, with "Hello, Mrs Oliver", by large, bearded fathers, whom she remembered as five year olds, left her at a complete loss.

In this candlelit church one Christmas Eve, listening with delight to Mum singing 'Oh Holy Night' with the choir, she worried about getting her part right, it was just beautiful.

She told of her private amusement when at a LADS show, reprising Joyce Grenfell, as she called the 'class' to order, every former pupil in the audience sat up sharply.

"Grandma was an utterly happy and positive soul with a great sense of humour. I'll never forget her infectious laugh and smile, Grandma teaching us nursery rhymes on the piano, our special Christmases all together, her well prepared breakfast table along with her great biscuit stash."

She made a life in Luxulyan for 60 years and she will be missed from the community at The Grove, in Charlestown.

On behalf of Mum, spoken by Mrs March, in *Little Women* by Louisa May Alcott, this is for ALL of Mrs Oliver's children: "The love, respect, and confidence of my children was the sweetest reward I could receive, for my efforts to be the woman I would have them copy."

EMAIL FROM OXFORD

I was listening to a discussion on the radio recently on the topic of the weather and how it hadn't been particularly great for getting the best of the autumn colours. For some reason it struck home and has made me look around to determine whether I agreed with their views. I came to the conclusion that they obviously aren't seeing the same things I am. All the varying colours of the leaves from bright amber to deepest maroon, bright red rose hips, orange pumpkins and vibrant yellow of late flowering shrubs such as mahonia or winter jasmine with their delicious scent. I have to admit the colours don't seem to have lingered as long or perhaps been as 'in your face' as the last year or two, but they are there none-the-less and I have been able to enjoy the pleasure of walking through the crispy, colourful leaf litter before it inevitably fades to brown.

There is a leaf sketch by Monty Python which starts with a couple of leaves dropping off a tree, shortly followed by the rest. She's fairly good at recall most of the time, however the red mist descends, and the ears stop working when a squirrel is sighted or even smelt, which at the moment is pretty much everywhere. Being able to see a zooming red and green light amongst the leaf litter has been really helpful in our ability to follow/call/catch the excited little squirt.

A walk to the closest park includes 'squirrel alley' as we have come to know it. Another local park has sooo many squirrels that her little radar is on overdrive the whole time. The last time we took her she was so distracted with watching the squirrels above her head that she fell off the log she was standing on, which was about a foot high. It was the funniest thing to watch, as you don't expect a dog to fall sideways onto the floor without at least trying to save

themselves, which she didn't seem to even attempt. As you can imagine, it didn't stop her focus, and she was up and off as quick as nine-pins. Daft dog!

There are positive perceptions to be found in all situations. Heading into the long nights of winter can be challenging for some, so looking for situations that bring comfort or hygge (that feeling of peaceful happiness) is a helpful practice in seeing us through to brighter days again. I found these poems recently which hint at some of the positive perceptions and enjoyably cozy evenings to look forward to. You can't beat the smell and warmth of a log fire in the winter, especially if there's a tot or two of mulled wine going around too!

ENVIRONMENT COLUMN

Luxulyan Environment Green Glebe Space

As we approach another winter, we are aware of the need to protect our biodiversity! The leaf fall has been considerable this year and plenty of creatures use the leaf piles

for hibernation. The bug houses are still in use and the dead hedges also provide good hibernation material.



As reported in the last issue, we hosted a scything course in September and scythed a considerable amount of our meadow area ready for wildflower seeding. It was hard work but good fun and very satisfying to look back on. The growth was then raked up so that the soil becomes less rich – much better for wildflowers. Thank you to everyone who scythed and raked up. Some were better than others at the skill of scything, some of us need a lot of practice! While raking up we came across numerous frogs and autumn has brought a selection of interesting and different fungi out in the various areas. The native apple trees

are thriving and although they didn't produce fruit this year (and not expected to) they are a great addition to the landscape.

We will continue to plant our hedgerows this winter and hope to dig out (with help!) a pond in the New Year, so exciting developments in the future.

It has been great to meet some of the people who use the site on a regular basis for a bit of peace and quiet, a de-stress and a salve for their mental health.

We will be hosting the Outdoor Nativity for the church on Sunday 22 December at 2.30 pm; it will be good to share our area for community use!

Our volunteer mornings continue on the second Saturday of the month, and we welcome everyone who can help even in a small way.

FROM CHURCH



When I was first ordained, I had a clear idea of what it would mean to be a successful Vicar. By those standards I have failed miserably! Thankfully I have decided that those standards were both unrealistic and had little to do with what this weird job called Vicaring is all about. Far more importantly I am not sure they even had much to do with being a Christian or a good person.

It turns out that it is not my job to persuade and cajole totally uninterested people into coming to church - lovely though it would be if I was successful at that. Instead, I think I am on this earth to love God, love my neighbour, and perhaps along the way others might think that looks like an attractive way to live.

As you may have guessed this will be my last article as the Vicar of St Blazey and Luxulyan, and it's inevitable that I am going to get a little misty-eyed and nostalgic about the last eight

years. It's a good thing to reflect every now and then and to ask "What could I have done better?" That doesn't need to mean a dose of self-flagellation, more a simple desire to learn what I need to learn from this time and to take some little encouragements and happy memories with me on the next stage of the journey.

I think I have changed quite a bit in the last few years, I am more self-assured, more realistic about my manifold failings and I value the little things which my younger self would have dismissed. I have become what my friend calls more of a 'starfish person'. I am sure that I have shared this story before - but here is a little reminder.

Once upon a time there was an old man who used to go to the beach every morning. Early one morning he was walking along the shore after a big storm had passed and found the beach littered with starfish, as far as the eye could see.

In the distance the old man noticed a small boy. Every few seconds the boy would bend down, pick up a starfish, and throw it into the sea.

The old man walked over and asked him what he was doing.

"I'm throwing starfish into the sea. The tide has wash them up and they can't return to the sea by themselves. When the sun gets high, they will die, unless I throw them back into the water."

The old man replied "But there must be thousands of starfish on the beach. You won't be able to make much of a difference."

The boy bent down, picked up another starfish and threw it into the ocean. Then he turned to the man, smiled and said "But it made a difference to that one".

As we approach Christmas, that wonderful time when we celebrate the light of the world, Jesus Christ, descending into the darkness of this world, it's easy to dismiss it all as a nice story.

When we hear the traditional readings at a carol service we may be tempted to think of the incarnation - God made flesh - as something of cosmic significance but something that makes little real difference here and now, to our lives.

And so, I simply wanted to remind you that God sent His son in the world for *you*. So that in *your* darkness the light might come. So that in *your* grief or pain you might find faith and hope for a better future.

You are one of the starfish that our loving God walks along the beach to rescue.

Amidst the big-ness of Christmas, don't lose sight of the little-ness of Jesus. He came as a person so that we might know Him walking by our side day by day.

And in turn you and I are called to be those starfish people, who may not save the world by lunchtime, but who pay attention to every person we encounter and bring light into their darkness as Jesus brings light to ours.

"Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, to all the people you can, as long as ever you can." (John Wesley)

While I am very sad to be moving away, I am so grateful that our God is faithful. In both space and time he 'hems us in, behind and before.'

FROM CHAPEL




Dear friend

15th SEPTEMBER 2024




I discover a newly emerged common green shield bug on a helenium stem and its exuvia close by.



17th SEPTEMBER
The Harvest 'super moon' rises dramatically behind the ragged hawthorns boughs.







20th SEPTEMBER

Warm at 20°C. A chiffchaff calls strongly and frequently up in the willows above the stream. This is the latest in the year I have heard this sound so redolent of summer days. Ripe rowan berries litter the ground, but plenty still remain on the trees.

22nd SEPTEMBER



The autumn equinox. Raindrops hang from the blooms of cosmos and dahlias, their bright, pastel hues blending with the rich, deeper shades of dying foliage on the surrounding trees. Above them a male southern hawker dragonfly cruises back and forth.

25th SEPTEMBER

A wet day. I pause to observe the simple beauty of a raindrop captured in the centre of some lupin leaves.

27th SEPTEMBER

Cool. In the garden this afternoon the late September sunlight is pale and weak, warming neither body nor soul as the wild winds of autumn rage around me.

2nd OCTOBER

A tattered large white butterfly makes its weary way across the flower garden. Its days in the sun will have been few this dull, wet summer. The goldfinches begin to return to the



feeders now, back from the wider countryside where they will have been feasting on a plethora of ripe seeds.

3rd OCTOBER Two nuthatches

busy themselves taking sunflower seeds from the dispensers and flying off, returning very quickly for more.

7th OCTOBER

Heavy downpours this afternoon causing flooding in Truro and surrounding areas.

8th OCTOBER

The southern hawker patrols the dahlia border again, flying deftly between the gently falling leaves.

11th OCTOBER

Bullfinch lane is strewn with sodden sycamore foliage and the smell of mould permeates the silent air. The nuthatches continue their daily visits, frantically garnering the seeds to store for colder days. The blackbirds have not yet returned to the feeding area, but I discover a male bathing in the rivulet between ponds TWO and THREE.

15th OCTOBER



The fallen rowan berries, now squashed and nibbled, are scattered on

the ground, vivid scarlet against the dark, saturated leaf litter. Dying bramble leaves glow like welcome

beacons on this gloomy autumn day.

17th OCTOBER

Mild. The elderberries that shone like clusters of ebony buttons in the late summer sunlight have all disappeared and only their skeletal stalks remain. The birds, notably the blackbirds and thrushes will have devoured the tiny, juicy fruits. Nearby I hear the first agitated calls of some redwings announcing their arrival from Scandinavia to

spend the winter here.



19th OCTOBER

Morning sunlight plays upon the raindrops adorning the glowing cotoneaster berries.



1st NOVEMBER

A passing breeze sends down a pattering shower of crisp, dry beech leaves around me, the sound blending with the faint, pensive subsong of a blackbird. Such are the sweet nuances of autumn days for those who pause to listen.

4th NOVEMBER

The mild, dry weather continues. Seven blackbirds have now moved in from the surrounding areas as their supplies of natural food gradually becomes depleted.

8th DECEMBER 1981

As we walk to our classroom, we stop to watch a song thrush seeking food at the base of our playground hedge. Later we see a small flock of black-headed gulls flutter down, thus bringing the number of bird species seen here today to thirteen. They are as follows, starling, chaffinch, robin, blackbird, greenfinch, pied wagtail, collared dove, blue tit, great tit, magpie, house sparrow, song thrush and black-headed gulls.

20th JANUARY 1982

Young Daniel points out the new, shiny green leaves of the cuckoo pint unfurling on our playground hedge.

23rd JANUARY 1982

David draws my attention to a brambling on the bird feeder which hangs high in the sycamore. It is joined briefly by a male siskin. Both these colourful birds are recent arrivals we have not previously seen here.






