



When Robin and Arlene moved to Cornwall, they became active members of Luxulyan Church, and soon Robin was singing in the Choir, Christopher an acolyte, and Arlene stationed in the front, or nearly-front pew. At that time Robin was often called abroad on work, and I remember him coming to church one Sunday and casually remarking that he had left Frankfurt that same morning. He was quite interested in writing music on his laptop, which could usefully occupy his waits at distant airports, and we included some of his music in Communion services. When the Band failed to commit to the usual Christmas carol engagement one year, Robin was quick off the mark, rounding up singers, which led to the establishment of the now-traditional Nine Lessons and Carols on Christmas Eve. He worked very hard at whatever was needed, fundraising, Churchwarden, PCC planning, and much more. He and Arlene have always been very hospitable, and with a varied selection of alcoholic beverages and snacks on offer, making PCC meetings held at Trevellion Barn into convivial affairs. And who could forget the delicious vegetable-derived soups that he made for Soup n Sweet lunch? When Covid came along with no public gatherings allowed, Robin proved himself a techno-adept, and the services were streamed on Zoom, which must have cost him a great deal of extra-curriculum time. Even the Nine Lessons went out on Youtube one year. But it was not all hard graft! Many of us enjoyed seeing photos of his New Years Day swims, on one occasion at least dressed as a Sister Nun. I heard about his kayaking to St Winnow church on the River Fowey. His acceptance speech of the St Piran Award was sung, not spoken, to the amazement of the congregation. He was an ideal Chairman, including to St Austell Choral Society, showing clear direction without coercion, always allowing independent viewpoints to be heard. Thank you Robin for everything that you have done over the past 30 years.

CHLOE SCOTT - ARCHER

I started the 2025 season with two main aims. To hit the 690/720 mark and to get picked for the World Youth Championships in Canada and hopefully reach the top tier of qualification scores for this. At my first competition of the season, I shot a 688 and later that month at the National tour stage one I shot a 681 followed by four great head-to-head matches to stand on the podium in 3rd place alongside two senior GB archers.

The season was quite a challenge at times with some difficult weather conditions, but my scores remained consistent and by July I was regularly hitting over 685/720. At our own club shoot in July at Colquite Estate I managed a 692 and a 690 out of 720 so came away very pleased. I was selected to represent GB at both the European Cup 2nd leg and the World Youth Championships. At the European Cup I finished the qualifiers as the highest ranked female but was knocked out in the quarter finals. I returned home with a bronze medal in the mixed team event.

On our way to the airport ready to travel out to Canada we got the devastating news that Air Canada had gone on strike and despite a lot of time and effort by the management team to find alternative transport for us all it wasn't to be and they could only send a reduced team of three over 18 compound archers.

I finished the outdoor season representing Devon and Cornwall at the National team competition where I got to shoot with my dad in the mixed team, not something you can do in many sports. I finished the outdoor season ranked number one in the under 18's women, number two in the under 21's and 15 in the senior rankings.

The indoor season was mixed as I had an injury for two months but represented England in the Home Nations event at the Indoor nationals where we came away with gold in the team event and in Hampshire at the beginning of February, I shot a junior and senior national record. Over the winter I have been training with the junior and senior GB squads and I'm aiming to get selected to represent GB at the European Cup and the European Championships later this year for the under 21 team.

I would like to say a huge thank you to the Luxulyan coffee morning group for their very kind donation. It is greatly appreciated and makes a huge difference as all of my training is at the National Sports centre at Lilleshall and 95% of my competitions are at least a 3-hour journey away.

Looking forward now to the 2026 outdoor season. (Picture on the back page)

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JANUARY '26 – GORETTI, INGRID AND CHANDRA; A TRAGEDY FOR TREES OR CHANCE FOR NEW GREEN SHOOTS?

We've had more than 10 years now of our Met office copying America and giving names to incoming storms. Are they memorable for that or because they arrive more frequently and create more damage? Whatever the implication of naming, storms are clearly becoming a major headache for landowners. This January each storm came from a different wind direction, and as their roots were in very soft, wet ground, the result was hundreds of trees pole-axed within a couple of weeks. If you have recently walked from Luxulyan to the viaduct or through the valley you will be fully aware of the massive damage, especially where one route of the Saints Way is now impassable.

The challenge of course, is nature will recover and new plants will become established, over time, but that doesn't help the walkers who find they must turn back or scabble through the debris. They want the chainsaws out ASAP! Pondering the challenge, Meadow Barns staff, supported by Luxulyan church, shop and pub, decided to assemble an application to Great Western Railway funds, for a youth project in the school summer holiday.

We created and fully costed a scheme – with suitable professionals supporting – to deliver training in tree surgery, wood crafts and 'Meet & Greet' skills, which also should include business advice so the young people get a taste of running a new enterprise to make and install way-marker signs for the Saints' Way, plus designing, making and selling decorated wood platters.

We believe these activities would deliver multiple benefits - improving fitness, catering for those growing numbers with ADD-type disorders and addressing barriers for young people taking first steps onto the career ladder. Holiday can give the teens that much-needed break from normal school routine, where they may be sitting down most of the day, swiping or clicking away to navigate screens. We also invite those in their twenties to come on board as leaders in a collaborative TWEENS Team, where the new opportunities may be experienced by all - like a grown-up type of Forest School.

Looking at the prototype gold signs and gold flowers, we chose 'Good as Gold Project' as the name and now we await a decision from GWR on whether they will provide a grant. Fingers crossed! But there are other avenues to explore if not successful.

So, if you know any young person aged from 10 to 30 years, suitably 'Good as Gold' in their motivation to take part, please bring or send them to one of our free 'Walk and Talk' opportunities, meeting at 10.30 on Monday 13th April, in the station yard, Tuesday 14th in church or Thursday 16th by the Institute with a long walk to follow. Last summer I noticed an inordinate number of ladybirds, something of a phenomenon not seen since the 70's. If the same happens again this year, you have to wonder on the impact this will have on species they feed on and in turn are then preyed upon. What change or difference will we notice then, if we're paying attention? I've certainly seen a large number of ladybirds congregating in the garden this spring. Of course, they will naturally gather to overwinter together, so perhaps they hadn't quite dissipated? Something for my curious mind to keep a note of over the coming months.

Spring has sprung the grass is riz, I wonder where them birdies is.... the first part of a little spring ditty written by an anonymous someone back in the day, and one I remember singing along to in Lanlivery School, many moons ago. I can't remember anymore of the words, but it was a fun song to sing along to, and it remains a fun little quip that pops up every now and again.

With Amelia reaching an age where words are now interesting, I'm starting to try to recall some of the many songs and lullabies I sang as a child, to provide some variety for me as much as her. Thank goodness for books that hold the version I remember. I recently found a nursery rhyme book written by Iona and Peter Opie. They studied for years collecting as many nursery rhymes, folk ballads and other verses as they could. There's about 800 in the book, many of them obscure little ditties, but still fun to read. Considering most of the nursery rhymes were made up to describe something or someone at one time, the mind boggles at their original meaning and intent.

There's also the wonderful world of fairy tales to explore. If you stick true to the originals, then they can be a hard read with usually someone coming worse off and not necessarily ending happily. The tales were designed to pass on an important moral or meaning to the next generation. Or you can take Disney's view where there may be darkness on your journey, but there's usually a happy ending, of sorts. Currently our household subscribes to Disney's version where there's always a silver lining.

Looking out for the silver linings in day-to-day life helps me to practice being grateful for all the positivity surrounding us. This in turn helps me to notice how many positive things are occurring around me, much more than the negatives by a long shot. It's a good practice to cultivate, especially on those blue days when the doom and gloom feels overwhelming.



In Memory of Alice Antonia (Toni) Olsson
8 November 1938 – 6 February 2026

Toni was a much-respected churchwarden at Luxulyan Church during the 1990's and was instrumental in setting up the churchyard as a 'Living Churchyard' when the Churchyard was 'closed' in the late 1990s. Toni was a committed member of the churchyard team until she could no longer attend; Toni was much more!

In the early 1980s Toni was a founder member of LAND – Luxulyan Against Nuclear Development. The Central Electricity Generating Board had identified land on the outskirts of Luxulyan as a potential site for a nuclear power station and was carrying out test drilling at Lower Menadue Farm. Members of LAND including Toni lay down in front of the drilling rig or chained themselves to it. They laid siege to the rig from mid-May until the end of October but, after a High Court ruling, they left the site in a peaceful manner. Toni was extremely proud of her role in preventing the construction of a nuclear power station here and in establishing Luxulyan as a Nuclear Free Zone.

Her brother summed up Toni entirely:
'Among other things, Toni was (in no particular order, and far from a complete list) Teacher, Musician, Peace Campaigner, Raconteur, Life-long Dog Lover, Party Giver, Voracious Traveller (but never by air), Internationalist, Gardener, Enthusiast, Nature Lover, Home Support Worker, Bridge Builder, Worshipper (in many traditions), Funlover, Host to Foreign Students, Treasure Hunt designer, Supporter of Local Initiatives, Inspiration, Family Researcher, Soldier of Christ, Staunch and Loyal Friend, (and, almost always, late!).'

Toni will leave a huge gap in many, many people's lives and we will miss her - from all at Luxulyan Church.

I let them out in the garden today as I was shifting compost and they followed me everywhere!

There were two doors not properly fixed to the calf pens, and one had a block wall part knocked down. So, on a rainy day (choose any of the week), I got the cement out and started work. Then Ashley the Jersey came in and decided my block laying wasn't straight enough, but she didn't use the spirit level, so I had to relay them.

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
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ENVIRONMENT COLUMN

FROM CHURCH

“Do not be afraid”

Dear friends,

As I write, it's Saturday, the week before Mothering Sunday and it hasn't rained, well yet anyway. The sun is shining, the spring flowers are out revealing beautiful colours and giving us a glimpse of those signs of new life.

As we come again to this Easter season, we reflect that in Mark's Gospel, that it is some women who first discover the joyous Easter news. The stone is rolled away and an angel tells them, 'Do not be afraid'. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here.' We then read that they were indeed afraid as they walked away, and who can blame them?

When reading the Gospel's, I find myself again and again grateful for the disciples. A more human group of individuals you would be hard pressed to find. They can be egotistical, over excited and even selfish at times. They betray, deny and desert their Lord and teacher. Yet they also gladly give up their jobs, security and homes to follow this same Lord. They are a mass of contradictions.

Loyal yet fickle. Believing yet argumentative. Devoted yet sometimes displaying a scandalous lack of faith given what they had witnessed. We can, I believe, all find something of our own life journeys in those disparate groups of women and men chosen by Jesus to be his closest friends. They are like us, experiencing the same fears, uncertainties, loves and delights. Nowhere is this more the case than during the events of Easter.

Here the disciples experience enormous loss, not once but twice. The loss of Jesus' death then the loss of his return to God. After the last of these, at the Ascension, I feel for the disciples most of all. They know that Christ is risen, they know that no matter their foibles or failures, he has conquered death and entered into glory. And yet, they are left bereft, confused and uncertain as to what to do next.

However, something extraordinary then began to happen. As the disciples and others encountered the risen Jesus, new signs of life began to appear. They begin to spread the good news, to speak of all they had seen and shared with Jesus and the church was born.

This new life spread to all the areas of the known world through the bold and unashamed proclamation of the disciples, who themselves had been transformed from a group of terrified and deserting former followers into the founders of Christendom.

The words 'Do not be afraid' appear many, many times in the Bible, in varied contexts. I think we should all take them to heart for comfort in times of fear and uncertainty.

The life changing message of Christ took hold because his friends and followers spoke up, in the face of harsh persecution. Many lost their lives but, undeterred, more and more came to faith and the Jesus revolution began.

A good starting point would be to remember the angel's words at the tomb; 'do not be afraid'. The message of Easter is one of new life after desolation. It is a message which is unchanged through history. The God who reached out to that eclectic group of first followers in the person of Jesus, is still calling out to us, willing us to stop struggling against Him and to come home.

Far from an offensive message, the teachings of Christ are about love, forgiveness, tolerance and peace. There is nothing to be ashamed of and everyone who calls themselves Christians should speak up and pass on the good news that "Christ is risen". What is there to be afraid of in light of that? A very happy and Blessed Easter to you all.

If the post-Easter narratives of the Bible tell us anything, it is that we are called to recognise where God is at work — including within ourselves, through the many gifts we have been given. The question then becomes: do we sanitise God, containing him within the boundaries we feel comfortable with?

Nina Simone began life singing in church. Her mother was convinced that her God-given talent should be used solely for the glory of God — meaning gospel music, and nothing else. When Nina began to write and perform popular music, her mother condemned it as the devil's work. A powerful voice in the black liberation movement in America, a one-woman propaganda machine for justice and equality. Her passion was rooted in a childhood experience. At an early concert where she was the sole performer, her parents were made to give up their front-row seats because they were not white — her parents' quiet acceptance of their humiliation, made its mark. Her voice and talent were ultimately put to God's use — just not in the way her mother had imagined.

History has taught us we cannot confuse the work of God with the institution of the Church. More often than not, the work of God has continued despite the Church. Since its earliest days, the Church's true calling has been to recognise God outside its walls — beyond worship, beyond respectable society.

We are called to see God in the broken, the despised, the rejected, and the suffering. It is in the forsaken places and the forsaken people that we encounter God most truly.

As we celebrate the Easter season we may hear the story of Thomas, who has gone down in

history as Doubting Thomas. A few years ago I wrote this poem in honour of Thomas:

They call me Doubting Thomas – a funny sort of name – but then I was not with them that night when Jesus came. They call me Doubting Thomas because I had not seen the scars on Jesus' hands and side where nails and spear had been.

And there is a well-attested tradition that St Thomas took the Christian gospel to India. That took a lot of faith.

Doubting Thomas? I don't think so.



COUNTRY DIARY

6th JANUARY 2026

Snow and ice cause chaos on Cornish roads. I keep the birds well supplied with food and a squirrel feasts on some acorns that I have saved for such conditions.



8th JANUARY

After a period of deceptive calm, early this evening Storm Goretti hits hard soon after 7.00pm. Wind speeds of up to 99mph are recorded on the Isles of Scilly. Here it roars like a giant down the chimney with terrifying gusts. Our Duchy is badly affected with the west especially suffering. The north coast experiences wind speeds of 120mph. Tens of thousands of properties across the county are without power.

9th JANUARY

The full extent of the damage caused by the storm becomes apparent with St. Michael's Mount alone having lost 80% of its trees! Such carnage is replicated across the Duchy and beyond. Today, in contrast, is calm and chilly. I feed the birds at first light, unable to imagine how they could have kept safe during the tumult of the savage night.

12th JANUARY

Mild and dry after some overnight rain. Mid-afternoon a song thrush chirrup loudly on Rowan Bank and I find the first snowdrop in bloom. A sense of renewal and optimism pervades.



13th JANUARY

Fat, pink camellia buds litter the ground where the bullfinches have dropped them. The tawny owls are very vocal tonight.



17th JANUARY

High up in an ash tree a blackbird feasts on the ripe berries of a thick festoon of ivy, the leaves shimmering in the afternoon sunlight. The sky is ice blue.



22nd JANUARY

A wet day. A glorious array of snowdrops illuminates dark corners of the garden and lifts one's spirits.

23rd JANUARY

Storm Ingrid ushers in yet more rain and gales.

25th JANUARY

Calm, dry and sunny.

26th JANUARY

Storm Chandra arrives like an unwelcome guest and brings over 51mm of rain in the St. Austell area and causes floods around Cornwall.

27th JANUARY

I watch as the sunlight sets a raindrop pulsing like a mesmerising, flashing beacon. A female blackcap pays a nervous and brief visit to the suet dispenser. Later a confident goldcrest flies in.



31st JANUARY

This has been the wettest January in Cornwall since records began in 1836!

1st FEBRUARY

The bluebell shoots are well through but some have been nibbled by rabbits.

7th FEBRUARY

Mid-morning I hear the first chaffinch song of the year. It cascades through the tracery of the winter-bare branches and the breath of the north wind. It heralds the approach of spring. The hazel catkins have developed, pushing off any remnants of dead leaves.

9th FEBRUARY

16mm of rain has fallen in the last 24 hours. The deluge continues. It seems ENDLESS!

10th FEBRUARY

More rain!

14th FEBRUARY

Cooler but dry and sunny. The ponds reflect the golden sunlight, and the 'Freedom Bell' camellia is in bloom.

18th FEBRUARY

February 'Fiil-Dyke' continues with rain all day. 28mm have fallen in the past 24 hours.

21st FEBRUARY

Through the relentless rain I hear the tuneless, rambling song of a missel thrush and the pensive, mellifluous melody of a blackbird nearby.



28th FEBRUARY

Becoming dry. Goldcrests and long-tailed tits have recently joined the regular visitors to the feeding area. The butter-yellow of the gorse blossom and the daffodils now offer welcome

sustenance to early pollinators. The hawthorns show tiny white dots of leaf buds alongside remaining, shriveled haws.

4th MARCH

Two bumble bees seek nectar in the sunlit, withered blooms of some snowdrops.

7th MARCH

Dry and mild. Through the sound of the turbulent stream, I hear the first chiffchaff call of the year.

10th APRIL 1980

In the woods at Cotehele we find many dog violets and windflowers. High up in the tree canopy two green woodpeckers utter their distinctive 'yaffles'. The Ladies' Smocks begin to bloom. We discover an oil beetle and, on some stinging nettles, a peacock butterfly caterpillar.

11th MAY 1980

As we walk in the garden, we are suddenly made aware of a very familiar sound. The swifts are announcing their return with much exuberant screaming as they sweep the morning skies. Welcome back.

Now that May is here.

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


